in the rough forms of these blocks of granite. Some of them conceal fine sandy coves with azure water. And two giant rocks even surround the guardhouse in Meneham!

Our inhabitants know they are lucky to live here. They will be happy to share their knowing advice to make sure your stay with us is unforgettable.

Inspiring the legends of tomorrow

Le Groupe Ouest is a film lab in Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages where select filmmakers are invited to come and fine-tune their scripts. Eight to 12 people are in residence at any given time, assisted by script doctors.

Charlotte Le Vallégant co-manages the lab with Antoine Le Bos, founder of this adventure, and supports the writers throughout their residencies.

For her, the Côte des Légendes is an inspiring setting in general, thanks to the strength that it exudes. It is natural, with its granite that's "been here forever" and its "eye-popping sky", and that seems to radiate "something very peaceful". The strength of the environment helps to settle writers' ideas as they go for walks during their free time. "It's like a natural cocoon."

Charlotte explains that, for them, their stay on the Côte des Légendes remains "seared into their minds, in terms of both their personal experience and how it fuelled their films. They are immersed in an environment that puts everyone on equal footing. At the same time, they're here because they need to shake things up to find that spark that will ignite the films that they came to work on. [...] That's how Le Groupe Ouest was formed, by bringing together all of the favourable conditions needed to shake our writers up with their projects.".

In 2016, the year of its 10th anniversary, Le Groupe Ouest became the top spot in Europe for coaching filmmakers and top in France for professional training for scriptwriters and directors during the writing phase. After 14 years, it has passed the symbolic number of 800 filmmakers, from 50 countries, coached in residence here, on the Côte des Légendes!



To the horizon!

As a tourist destination, Brest Terres Océanes offers wonderful, restful experiences for you. Explore the lighthouse route, which boasts the largest concentration of lighthouses in the world. You can even tour five of them. Take to the sea as you head to Ouessant Island, trying your hand at paddleboarding or sailing aboard a heritage boat. Feel like walking to the end of the world? The GR®34 national hiking trail follows nearly 400 kilometres of coastline for excursion in the fresh sea air. Travel with your feet on dry land as you explore Océanopolis in Brest, wander from headlands to capes on Crozon Peninsula, spend a few hours peacefully kayaking on the Aulne, and the list goes on.

Rocks

They're everywhere! Whether dotting the seashore or standing by houses farther inland, they are an integral part of our landscape. Many find them intriguing, but also entertaining for the amazing shapes you can see in them. Just like people, each one has its own identity. These granite behemoths are a part of our lives and their longevity in the face of the elements commands respect. Set off to discover the mysteries they protectively keep and let your imagination run wild!

From springs to fountains

They have always been considered as beneficial, if not miraculous. Water is a symbol of life, and its worship dates back to very ancient times. Converted into Catholic places of worship, our grandparents remember people would simply go there for themselves or to ask for a loved one to be healed.

Seen as nature's pharmacy, they had the reputation of being able to heal almost any ailment: hearing, sight, breathing, weakness, and more

Although their popularity has declined, they are still part of our history and our culture.

Crosses and megaliths

Megaliths are an inseparable part of Brittany, and the Côte des Légendes is no exception. From those age-old masses to crosses and crucifixes, these witnesses of the past are now a reflection of a significant segment of our cultural history.

In this land with its Celtic roots, evangelical monks began to twist beliefs in their favour, beginning in the 5th century. Carved out of granite, dolmens, menhirs and steles were in turn Christianized, buried or destroyed.

We are reminded of this reclaimed or preserved heritage whenever we leave the house: on roadsides, in gardens, on town squares, in religious monuments, and the list goes on...

Legend of the wreckers

Legend tells us the story of a people, the Paganiz. They were independent, undisciplined, unsubdued and even rebellious beings. It is said that those men and women would hang lanterns from cows' horns, at night and in bad weather, to cause the wrecks of boats out to sea.

Then, when the ships would sink or beach on the shore, the Paganiz would kill any survivors and throw their bodies into the sea, after having robbed them of all their goods. Although this legend is unfounded, having never been proved, it has helped to foster a mysterious aura throughout the region.



The Côte des Légendes in stories

People's imaginations have been working for centuries to explain the landscape of the Côte des Légendes.

Sometimes logical, often strange, and always surprising, these tales and legends have been handed down by enthusiastic storytellers from one generation to the next.

In the summer, go for a walk with **Les Conteurs de la Nuit** on the beach in Kerlouan or listen to tales echoing through Saint-Egarec Chapel on a storytelling Tuesday (**Les Mardis Contés**).

In autumn and winter, the stories continue with **Les P'tites Fabriques** (see p. 40), during intimate gatherings in places not usually open to the public.

Revisit the days of the old customs officers or picture yourself in the shoes of the former inhabitants, thanks to the town's many activities, its museums and its temporary exhibitions.

A getaway in Meneham



As you as you arrive, you feel the energy of the village. Once you learn that the shipwreckers are only a legend, you climb atop the boulders. From there, you have a 360° view of a breathtaking coastline. A quick pic is a must, but above all the memory is engraved forever in your mind... You buy a souvenir (and have a nice chat with a passionate craftsmen) and then decide to venture out along this coastline carved into the rock. Nothing could be easier. You just head west along the GR®34! After just 2 kilometres, you come across Saint-Egarec Chapel and its miracle fountain. You enjoy a charming stop before continuing along the dunes to a "cow island" inhabited by strange creatures.

What a great walk! Next time, you'll try going east to see Pontusval Lighthouse, Pol Chapel, Hôtel de la Mer and the semaphore. There's never a dull moment on the Côte des Légendes...

When the village sleeps...

One autumn evening, the last passers-through head out of town, and the night gently wraps the village in its arms... Meneham finally seems to be offering itself to you, completely and unconditionally. You are watching a sunset that is one for the books when you think you spy the shadow of a shipwrecker prowling around... Phew! It's just a bunny rabbit out for an evening stroll. As the lighthouses of Pontusval and Ile Vierge begin their work guiding ships far at sea, you quietly enjoy a classic but timeless <code>crēpe complète</code> with ham, egg and cheese at the inn before trying out the experience of a night in a cupboard bed at the hostel. The lighthouse

LIKE A WHITE SEAGULL FACING THE OPEN WATERS AND SCANNING THE HORIZON, THE LITTLE LIGHTHOUSE IN PONTUSVAL WAS LIT UP FOR THE FIRST TIME ON 15 SEPTEMBER 1869.

Built at the time to alert ships to the dangerous reefs running along the Côte des Légendes, it is still in operation today, midway between the Ile Vierge and Ile de Batz Lighthouses. It has been a listed historic monument since 2011, and the building's owner, Phares et Balises, must still continue to maintain it.

This is a magical place, whose wonderment is only further accentuated by the fine sandy beaches lined with rocks sculpted by the wind, the sea and time.

Located in the new municipality of Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages, it is now one of the must-see gems of the Côte des Légendes.

The dragon

Each place has its own legend. In Pontusval, we talk about the dragon of Elorn. Each Saturday a person was chosen in a random draw from amongst the population of La Roche-Maurice, to be offered up to satiate the dragon's ravenous hunger. When the Lord of Elorn learned that this fate had befallen his two-year-old son, he decided to drown himself, rather than give up his child to the monster.

By luck, he was rescued by two knights passing by, who were stunned by his desperate act. The pagan lord then explained the reason for his despair, and the knights promised him that, if he converted, they would deliver him from the evil creature forever, an offer which the lord hastily accepted.

With a great deal of courage and effort, they captured the monster and threw it into the sea at Pontusval Headland, where it drowned.

Now you understand where the Pontusval's name came from: Poul beuz en eval, which means "chasm where the beast was drowned" in Breton.

The lighthouse keeper

Marie-Paule knows her lighthouse well, having looked after it since 1968! It holds no secrets for her, and she has accumulated many a memory in all those years, especially the 50 steps to the tower which she had to climb quickly in storms when the "electricity fairy" had succumbed to their power! For 35 years, the two were at their posts both from dusk 'til dawn, like an old married couple, making sure to keep the precious light burning for those out to sea.

The beacon has been automated since 2003, but Marie-Paule is still here. A native of Brignogan-Plages, often left alone with her children when her husband was away with the merchant marine, she had no desire to abandon her stony friend, with which she had lived in unison for so many years.

Now retired, she still lives in the lighthouse and will be the final tenant of this charming structure which stands 18 metres tall with a range of 10 miles (18 kilometres).




Pol Chapel

In the 16th century, the chapel was erected in the middle of the rocks, on the ruins of several successive buildings, namely including a former monastery founded by Saint Paul Aurelian (also known as Saint Pol). It was partially rebuilt in 1870.

Made of granite, it is surrounded by a small cross and a superb crucifix. A small customs hut was built on top of a nearby rock, that can be reached by a staircase carved into the stone. That hut was part of the old construction programme designed to monitor the coastline, under the aegis of the engineer Vauban in the late 17th century. The militiamen under the Aber-Wrac'h harbourmaster stayed there, on the lookout for enemy vessels and possible shipwrecks, but most for people attempting to pillage old wrecks.

At that time, the little chapel was mainly used as a guardhouse.



The curse of the country priest

It is said that one night, a sailor coming back from sea was caught in a violent storm that prevented him from getting home. He decided to take shelter in the chapel and spend the night there. On the stroke of midnight, two candles burst into flame, and a priest appeared. The vision terrified the sailor, who huddled up in his corner, without even daring to breathe. The priest started to say mass, "Introibo ad altare Dei..." He kept repeating this, in the hopes of a response, but nothing... The candles went out, and the priest disappeared. A long time after that adventure, the sailor decided to tell the priest in Plounéour-Trez about it. The priest suggested that he return and taught him the mass responses. The sailor went back the next year, on the same day, and the ceremony started up again. The petrified sailor took his courage in both hands and made the response.

At the end of the service, the priest thanked the sailor and explained that he was a soul in purgatory who was forced to come each year, on the anniversary of his death, to say mass in the little chapel, until some came and responded. That day, the sailor had finally freed him from his penance.

The Men Marz menhir

Located in Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages, Men Marz is one of the biggest standing stones, but also one of the first to be Christianized in Brittany.

Erected somewhere between 4500 and 2500 BC, its base is not buried in the ground, but simply sits on the earth, in balance. Listed as a historic monument since 1889, it is only of the four tallest menhirs in all of France.

Married within the year!

There is a deep gouge in the menhir, about 2/3 up.

Our elders used to tell us that unmarried girls would go to the menhir in Pontusval, take a pebble and throw it at the lip of that gash. If it stayed in place, they would be married within the year.

Marriage was important part of life in those days and was often linked to fertility.

At a rate of two pieces per year, the end goal is to create a real, original art walk where people can discover our heritage made of stone and words. Along our paths, fans of art and hikes will be treated to each creator's modern, playful take on a local legend.

Thanks to a participatory selection process involving elected officials, artists and tourism professionals, two works of art are chosen each year.

Thanks to the creativity and originality of the selected compositions, Les Ribin' de l'Imaginaire provide a wonderful illustration of the ambition and openness of our Côte des Légendes.

Urban Lesneven

A bit of history

Lesneven was a military capital in the Middle Ages and then later, the administrative and judicial capital of the Diocese of Léon, and is now a town of academics and commerce.

Known as the "town of three flowers", acknowledging its pleasant quality of life and environment, Lesneven is great to explore along its granite coloured streets lined with ancient houses. A focal point at the centre of the Côte des Légendes, it offers a multitude of local services and a wide selection of businesses.

Many boutiques liven up the town all year long.

Ursuline Convent

Build in stages beginning in 1720, the old Ursuline Convent has seen its share of history! It served in turn as annexe to the maritime hospital in Brest and then as a school for girls...

And there is only one surviving witness: the wisteria. Tucked away in the cloister, this old girl is now more than 150 years old and is fit as a fiddle. In fact, this is the longest wisteria in Europe on a single stem!

Have a blast with Léon

This character will take you on an exploration of the town of Lesneven, whose streets are packed with ancient houses. Solve riddles and find the town's star attractions.

German cemetery

Inaugurated in 1968, this site in Ploudaniel (as you exit Lesneven) is unique in Brittany. It holds the graves of 5,835 soldiers who died in Finistère and Côtes-d'Armor in the last world war.

Whether you take a guided tour or explore it on your own, you will undoubtedly be struck by the soberness and tranquillity of this place for quiet reflection.



Le Folgoët Basilica, an architectural gem

Fame & legend

The basilica is not only famous for the religious fervour and the legend that surround it.

The building itself is also a lovely architectural complex. The Gothic church built in the flamboyant style was the idea of Jean IV, Duke of Brittany, and was completed under the reign of his son Jean V in 1453. Anne of Brittany visited it on multiple occasions, which further enhanced its popularity. Although it was the victim of fires and damage during the French Revolution, it still managed to preserve its incredible rood screen made of delicately chiselled stones from Kersanton.

Outside, don't forget to take a look at the amazing fountain, whose source is under the basilica's high altar.

Salaün Ar Foll

This character, and the words he is said to have repeated continuously throughout his life, "Ave Maria", still resonate here. After the miracles said to have taken place following his death, the place became a major pilgrimage destination. His story inspired artists to create an installation in the orchard for Les Ribin' de l'Imaginaire 2020 (see p. 15).

Even now, more than 20,000 pilgrims come here each year, the first weekend in September, for the Pardon, a shared time where piety and belief are mixed with a touch of folklore, as people bring out their banners and costumes.





Nature on the Côte des Légendes

FOR NATURE ENTHUSIASTS AND THE CURIOUS-MINDED, THE CÔTE DES LÉGENDES OFFERS GEMS OF PROTECTED NATURAL SPACES: DISCREET ESTUARIES, REMARKABLE DUNES, FINE SANDY BEACHES AND BAYS, PEAT BOGS, PONDS AND RIVERS: A WHOLE PATCHWORK OF ECOSYSTEMS FOR DISCOVERY AND OBSERVATION.

The Natura 2000 network is a series of European nature sites, on land and in the sea, that have been identified for the rarity or fragility of their wild plant or animal species and their habitats. Natura 2000 reconciles the preservation of nature and socioeconomic concerns. These sites are terrific for hiking and the discovery of Mother Nature.





Marshes of Le Curnic



In Guissény: Known for the diversity of its habitat, this is an important wintering spot and migratory stop for birds. The riches of the site come from past human activities, combined with a unique geological setting. Dunes, wetlands, peat bogs, foreshores, a brackish pond and wild orchids cover 12 hectares around the sea wall pond in Le Curnic and Tresseny Bay.

Langazel wetlands

In Ploudaniel / Trémaouezan: The astonishing, remarkable site of the Langazel peat bog covers 275 hectares of moors, ponds, marshes and wetlands. Known as the oldest in Brittany, these marshes are nothing less than the source of the Aber Wrac'h. Formerly where peat was extracted to make up for shortages of coal, this site is now a recognized priority area with an extraordinary natural heritage.

Natural spaces

Goulven Bay and the dunes of Keremma



In Goulven / Tréflez: Spanning 6 km of white shoreline, a veritable treasure trove of shells to collect, Keremma and its beaches stretch from Goulven Bay to Kernic Bay. A mud flat, salt meadows, marshes, ponds and dunes with remarkable flowers: the wealth of flora and fauna here are proof of a preserved natural equilibrium.

In 2018, Goulven Bay joined Mont-Saint-Michel Bay and the Gulf of Morbihan as Wetlands of International Importance on the Ramsar List, Ramsar is a network that recognizes and promotes the sustainable management of these protected areas.

Working at Langazel



VINCENT LE VIOL HAS BEEN WORKING AT THE LANGAZEL WETLANDS FOR THE PAST THREE YEARS. THERE ARE TWO FULL-TIME EMPLOYEES SUPPORTED BY SOME 15 VOLUNTEERS. HE AGREED TO SPEND SOME TIME WITH US, TALKING ABOUT HIS PROFESSION AND SHARING SOME TIPS FOR YOUR VISIT!

Moors and meadows have become rare these days and, without human intervention, the environment would close in on itself, quickly turning into a forest and depriving itself of many species of plants and animals. At Langazel, the priority is placed on ensuring that the area remains open. Which is why the whole year is devoted to mowing and to developing integrated farming, where cows and horses are allowed to graze.

food chain for many birds, can encourage the return of endangered species like small passerines, 30% of which have disappeared over the last decade.

The area is open to the public, with a hiking trail and an interpretative route. Guided tours are also organized by the association and by Tourisme Côte des Légendes so you can discover the patchwork of environments contained within this protected area.


Key figures

When is best to visit?

- May and June, the ideal time to admire the flowers and watch the many butterflies fluttering about
- **September**, when the moor is bedecked with colours thanks to the pink blossoms on the heather and the yellow of the gorse!
- Autumn and winter, when the atmosphere is more mysterious, and some parts of the moor have flooded, leaving areas where trees shoot up straight out of the water. Boots are highly recommended!







Set your own pace

FROM A SIMPLE ROUTE OF JUST A FEW KILOMETRES TO A TREKKING ADVENTURE, THE CHOICE IS YOURS DURING ALL FOUR SEASONS. NOTHING COULD BE BETTER FOR EXPLORING THE CÔTE DES LÉGENDES THAN TRAVELLING ITS TRAILS ON FOOT, BY BICYCLE OR ON HORSEBACK.

Long & short trails

The Côte des Légendes offers 14 different loops for you to follow. You can choose from 6 to 15 km paths for your outing with family, friends or with experienced hikers. Walk in complete safety along carefully maintained trails waymarked by a colour code. Some of these routes can even be combined to extend the distance... and your enjoyment!

For fans of longer hikes that will take you through all of our different scenery, the three loops that form the Lesneven Country / Côte des Légendes Loop (97 kilometres combined) are made for you. These three entirely waymarked national hiking trails can be taken on foot, by bicycle or on horseback, with the appropriate detours.



GR®34 Coastal trail



Voted the favourite GR® of the French in 2017, this national trail runs along the entire coast of Brittany, from Mont-St-Michel to Saint-Nazaire. In other words, 2,000 km!

The section on the Côte des Légendes offers a wide array of scenery. Rocky headlands, wild coasts, marshes, dunes, beaches, coves, diverse flora and fauna, and a rich historical heritage: over its 32 km, you'll find a new postcard-worthy view at each turn.

A trail map is available at our Tourisme Côte des Légendes Tourist Information Bureaus. It lists all of the accommodation and services located nearby the GR®34.



An accessible route

In Kerlouan, you can enjoy 1.2 kilometres of an adapted coastal trail between La Digue and the Meneham Site. It is appreciated by our smallest walkers and families with pushchairs, and is also accessible by persons with reduced mobility.

"The authenticity gets me every time. It's a haven of peace for birds, an unparalleled spot to dig for shellfish and a real playground for fans of speed and strong sensations!

I don't have a favourite season, because they all have their own charm. By the sea or inland, I don't care, so long as I can enjoy the light of the morning..."

WHAT NOT TO MISS:

- Beg ar Groaz (Berry and Cross): from the colourful fishing boats to the majestic rocks, each with their own name just like people, the tableau you will see from this little cross on its natural promontory is truly striking.
- **Dievet dolmen**: surrounded by lush greenery under a blue sky.
- The church and town hall: the perfect duo. It's impossible to overlook St-Pierre Church and its stained glass windows. Its majestic bell tower has been watching over the town since 1734.





Cist hunt challenge

This surprising game involves searching for "cists", objects contained in boxes intentionally hidden somewhere by "hiders".

Just imagine the pleasure of finding the box and discovering what it holds! You will undoubtedly be a great "finder". Discover the "caches" of the Côte des Légendes for free on **cistes.net**.

Trail running, an outdoor activity with an edge!

IT INVOLVES RUNNING UP AND DOWN THE HILLS ON TRAILS COVERING A VARIETY OF TERRAIN AND DISTANCES.

By day or by night, set off on an active discovery of the Côte des Légendes. While we wait for the next permanent trail running site, we can already direct you to a few paths and training spots that will let you combine physical activity with your exploration of our region.

Recommended routes

Before you dash off like the fabled hare, we recommend a quick warm-up... Get your heart rate up, make sure you have the gear you need, with laces snugly tied, and you're off for a few kilometres of enjoyment surrounded by nature.

• Milin ar Raden Circuit

Set off to find the mysterious Milin ar Raden mill. This 10 km outing will give you the chance to discover the natural riches of the Natura 2000 site of Guissény. It will immerse you in a patchwork of ecosystems: rocky foreshores, beaches, peat bogs and a sandy bay.

· Aber Wrac'h Valley Circuit

Lanarvily is a small villages tucked away in the greenery of the valley of mills.

On the 8 km route, you will pass along the banks of the Aber Wrac'h, most on hilly, wooded paths.

For special training

Runners who want to do interval training and/or a few exercises on stairs, Georges Martin Stadium in Lesneven has an athletics track and stands with steps which you are free to use. It's ideal for working your quads and calves and for getting your heart pumping.

The sports complex at the racetrack next to Lesneven's Spadium swimming pool offers a 1 km loop covered in sand (but firm!), as well as a fitness trail... If you'd rather train by the ocean, there is another fitness trail in the Kervillo district of Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages. It's a must if you want to let off steam in a fun way, by combining a footrace with "GPP" (general physical preparedness).

Trail running events

All right! Your mind is clearer than ever, and you're raring to go. Now is the time to sign up for a trail running competition.

From fun races to extreme trail runs, there is something for every taste on the Côte des Légendes:


The Transléonarde

THIS IS THE MARATHON IN FINISTÈRE, FULL OF FRESH SEA AIR AND FRIENDLINESS. IT TAKES PLACE ANNUALLY IN JUNE.

From Plouescat to Guissény, it covers 42.195 km (precisely) of coastline.

Not yet ready for a full marathon? You can split the distance with a friend, as a marathon team, with one of you running 19.5 km and the other, 22.5 km. 10 km and 18 km walks are also arranged so you can discover the GR*34 coastal "customs officers' trail".

Each year, the event includes a 21K half-marathon between Plouescat and Goulven, open to para-athletic runners and racers in wheelchairs and racing chairs.



The Transléonarde is part of a nationwide network of "Festiviales" (fun runs).

Between serious racers kitted out from head to foot, you might come across others in rather odd get-ups, to say the least... The Transléonarde is open to any costume inspiration, running with the group or solo, but always with shoes on their feet!

This merry band usually meet up at the race's traditional pasta party and/or around a glass of the famous *kig ha farz*. They are known for always being there when runners, volunteers and families come together for a good meal!

And speaking of families, activities are also organized for kids, to help awaken their inner athletes!





2,500 athletes

Trail des Naufrageurs

Named after Meneham's legend of the shipwreckers (naufrageurs), this 14 km trail run is becoming just as well-known as its big brother, with more than 650 participants in 2019.



Spin your wheels

121 km of bike routes

We're sure you will be thrilled as you explore our Tro Vélo loops. On the small roads and ribinoù (dirt or gravel country lanes) of Pagan Country, these six routes will lead you on a discovery of the heritage and linguistic treasures of the Côte des Légendes.



Tro Vélo time!

You too can watch the scenery flying by as you venture onto the bicycle trails of the Côte des Légendes. A quick kick to the pedals and six Tro Vélo loops will invite you to discover the heritage of the Côte des Légendes.

These 15 to 25 km routes are undoubtedly one of the most fitting ways for you and your family to (re) discover this historical area enclosed within the legendary rocky coast.

Cycling 2

Cycle routes: Abers, Brest and the coastline

A large network of dedicated cycle routes cuts through the Côte des Légendes. The Véloroute du Littoral is an emblematic one which hugs the Breton coastline and passes through more than 30 kilometres of the Côte des Légendes. It meets up with the Véloroute de la Côte des Légendes at Goulven and then leads to Lesneven. From Lesneven, you are free to carry on towards Abers Country, Brest or Landerneau.

For mountain bikers

More than 200 km of paths suitable for sport or touring in a preserved nature setting are at your disposal. 12 of our hiking trails are suitable for mountain bikes.



Tro Bro Léon:

ribinoù in the wild West!



The Tro Bro Léon is a road cycling event which takes place in April. The races range from 26 to 117 kilometres, passing through Abers Country and the Côte des Légendes, cutting through the countryside on Brittany's famous *ribinoù*, as well as paved segments.

This is how the Tro Bro Léon got its nickname as the "Little Paris-Roubaix". Excitement and a good show are guaranteed.




Move your body

ON ROCKS LIKE NOWHERE ELSE IN THE WORLD!

With their bizarre shapes, they imbue the Côte des Légendes with wild charm, inspire painters and poets, and offer fantastic places for exploration, rest, hideaways and more.

But that's not all: for the past few years, they can also be scaled by the most agile adventurers and rock climbing enthusiasts. An original, sporting activity that is respectful of the explored environment since no special equipment is required. Across several kilometres, the Côte des Légendes offers amazing courses for all levels of climbers. An ideal spot in a dizzying natural setting.



Intro to rock climbing

Discovery experiences on boulders or climbing walls are offered during Festival Blokuhaka in Kerlouan and at the Meneham site during the Friday adventures of "Vendredis Qui Bougent".

Young and old alike can sample the simple joys of going vertical, a world of subtle sensations where you move around by intuition.





Blokuhaka

The big annual event for rock climbers! But it also offers introductions for beginners, athletic challenges, stand-up paddleboarding, yoga, acroyoga and more.

If you're not athletically inclined, massages and concerts are also on offer!

Ocean swimming

A PERFECT COMBO OF SPORT, ENJOYMENT AND BENEFITS OF THE WATER!

Calling all swimmers with flippers, triathletes and anyone else interested in a fun and vigorous exploration of the marine environment.

The Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages water sport centre, in partnership with Tourisme Côte des Légendes, has set up two ocean swimming courses (370 and 620 metres in length). Combined, they form a loop of about 1,200 metres!

Blue buoys numbered 1 to 8 are set up from June to September. They give swimmers the chance to assess their speed and see how far they've come. The courses were designed so swimmers can also enjoy the view of the underwater marine life that thrives around the rocks. Diving masks recommended!





Practical information

- Starting from Plage des Crapauds, close to the Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages water sport centre
- Open course, not monitored by lifeguards, for experienced swimmers only

An information panel close to the water sport centre explains the specifics of the course and notifies swimmers of the precautions they should take before diving in: distance between the buoys, ideal times and coefficient in respect of the tides, direction of the course and essential safety instructions.





#BeALegend

In August, swimmers come to compete in the Défi des Légendes ("Legends' Challenge"), a stage of the Coupe de Bretagne for open water swimming.

In Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages, starting from the water sport centre on Plage des Crapauds.

Three of the races are open to the general public: 500 m, 2,000 m and 4,000 m.




Dreamy beaches

Along the coastline of the Côte des Légendes, you will find a multitude of fishing holes in the sandy, rocky or muddy foreshores. Keep your eyes open for your catch of the day! But be careful! Don't pick up everything that you see. Not all species are edible and be sure to check the quotas on some of them, in terms of minimum sizes and total numbers...

Crucial for holidays by the sea. Having a hard time choosing between digging for shellfish and swimming? Do both! This guide contains a tide table, advice on shellfish digging and shore fishing, regulations, useful equipment, recipes and more. In short, an absolute must!

Are they biting?

River fishing


Between the Etang du Pont pond, the Flèche, Quillimadec and Aber Wrac'h Rivers and more, the bodies of water, rivers and tributaries here all offer amateurs the chance at a great catch, in an area with a high density of fish, where the large populations of brown trout, sea trout and wild salmon are unlikely to leave you empty-handed. Not to mention that "gourmet fishers" will love them! Those who prefer carnivorous fish will find what they seek along the Quillimadec, where tench, bream and pike are also well-represented.

Whether you prefer to use insects, minnows, artificial flies or ultralight lures as bait, any fishing technique can be used, given the expanses of water and the diversity of species living in the Côte des Légendes.

Information

Before you head off to indulge in your passion, we suggest you visit the website (in French) of AAPPMA Pays des Abers / Côte des Légendes at aappma-aberslegendes.org/aappma/aappma.html.

There, you will find suggestions of discovery routes to take and a variety of practical information about fishing permits and current regulations. Thanks to its team of volunteers, this association's work includes cleaning up and maintaining our rivers, setting up salmon spawning grounds and improving crossings of obstacles.



Beach fishing

Want to try for some pollack or sea bass? 32 kilometres of broken shoreline and fine sandy beaches await you. Now you just have to choose whether you will clamber over the rocks like a roving angler or set down your gear for a session of surfcasting on one of the beaches on the Côte des Légendes.

A fishing permit is not required here. However, a good understanding of your fishing hole and the weather forecast (tide tables, wind, swell, etc.) is vital to a successful outing... and to ensure you don't find yourself in an unpleasant position. We also recommend that you stay up to date on the latest regulations.

Watersport destination!

Get out your sails!

Water sport centres have all the gear you need. You can hire a windsurf board, a catamaran or a centerboarder (activities may vary from one centre to the next), to take out on your own or take a lesson.

Diving and snorkelling

The Côte des Légendes is the perfect place to discover extremely varied plantlife and wildlife in the deeps. You will feel like you're in the middle of a real underwater tropical forest. The Côte des Légendes has more than 35 diving sites, including the La Brière site where you can explore the wreck of the cargo ship, sunk off the coast from the Plage des Crapauds (Toad Beach) in Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages.

Land yachting for easy sailing

The vast expanse of Goulven Bay makes for a pleasant, safe place to enjoy this speed sport that is both easy to learn and accessible to anyone. The bay is a classified nature reserve that is nearly always windy. It can be used in all four seasons because it boasts the unique feature of remaining uncovered by the sea during neap tides.



Surf the waves

Riding a board attached to your wrist, you will need to learn to choose YOUR wave and then glide along it for several metres. Looking for a spot to get you started? Boutrouilles Beach in Kerlouan was made for you!

Kayaking between the rocks

Climb in for a trip alongside the rocks. The coast as seen from the sea... an experience you won't want to miss. This activity allows anyone and everyone to easily roam along the coastline. Row at your own pace and let the beauty of the omnipresent rocks be your guide. Special excursions can lead you to marine mammals and birds here, and a shipwreck there...

Kitesurfing gives you wings!

This traction sport combining the strengths of the sea and the wind is the fastest sailing activity on the water. There's no need to go to the ends of the earth for the perfect spot... Riding in Brittany: Goulven Bay and Vougo Beach are very popular amongst fans of board sports and adrenaline!



Stand-up paddle:

A smooth body of water and a light wind are your best friends when you engage in this board sport. Once you have found your equilibrium, you will appreciate the view of the ocean floor, through water that has never seemed so clear! It's amazing how much more transparent it seems once you are standing. The Plage du Phare in Plounéour-Brignogan-Plages lends itself perfectly to this activity.



Disconnect to reconnect

Created in Guissény in 2006, it takes place each year in July.


After its first few editions, the association was able to perpetuate this event combining art, traditional and contemporary culture and a very strong attachment to Pagan Country.

The result is ever-increasing audience numbers!

People originally came from neighbouring communities, but now the festival's loyal spectators flock from the whole department and even the region.

Offering theatre, music, dance and so on, this is without a doubt a major family-friendly event.

By taking over the site in Saint-Gildas, with its natural amphitheatre, the festival brings people together in a setting that encourages interaction. The organizers work to offer a varied programme throughout the weekend, with areas set aside for relaxing, discovering arts and crafts, and more.



Fest-deiz

At Meneham in Kerlouan, the association Avel Deiz offers activities throughout the year, with an emphasis on ancient and folk traditions, local dances and the crafts of yesteryear, amongst others.

And this includes festoù-deiz! These Breton music fêtes come to life in the centre of town. Each Sunday in summer, two groups perform, pulling participants and visitors into the traditional dances of Léon. Accordions, binioù, bombards and fiddles all join in on the fun. It's impossible to resist the call of the music.

You don't want to miss the local dance, the dañs round.

Let the chapels & churches ring out

EACH YEAR, OUR REGION'S CHAPELS AND CHURCHES EAGERLY AWAIT THE SOUNDS OF THE CLASSICAL MUSIC CONCERTS THAT TAKE PLACE WITHIN THEM.

Thanks to their fantastic acoustics, these sites are dream venues for listening to a programme of music which is as eclectic as it is surprising: classical, operatic, folk and traditional, French song and world music, but also more instrumental concerts, lesser-known pieces and jazz. Le Folgoët

Ty Guillerm farm

At Ty Guillerm farm in Guissény, they cultivate difference by choosing to rear two rustic breeds from Scotland which are suited to the local land and climate and are known for their premium tender, marbled meat: Aberdeen Angus, of average size and naturally hornless, and Highland, with its large horns and shaggy coat that make it seem to have come straight out of another age!

Since 2017, a small gift shop in the heart of the farm and close to the herds allows you to leave with a whole array of products in hand, which come directly from the farm: beef, pork, veal and free range chicken.

Beer & Brittany

Hops, barley and other grains have long thrived in northern Brittany.

During half of the 19^{\pm} century, brewing spiked in parallel to scientific discoveries. In 1880, Brittany was at its heyday with nearly 100 breweries! They were small batch beers which didn't tend to travel, being sold within a close range.



But by the 1950s, almost all of them had disappeared!

France went from 3,160 breweries in 1903 to fewer than 300 in the 1950s, just three of which were in Brittany.

The early 1980s were catastrophic: fewer than 20 breweries remained in all of France. The boom in microbreweries, which started in the US and then moved over to the UK, began to sweep across Brittany. The first craft brewery in France, Coreff (Breton for "barley beer"), was launched in Morlaix in 1985 and immediately faced resistance from industrial beer. It was followed by Lancelot, near Ploërmel, in 1990 and then by Sainte-Colombe, near Janzé, in 1996.

Nowadays, they're coming back in force!

The Côte des Légendes is no exception to the trend of this revival, with no fewer than three breweries setting up shop here. Brittany is currently the third largest beer-producing region in France. At the end of the day, it's just back to business as usual for a country that is more of a brewer than we might have thought!

Our two local specialities

Variation: pesked ha farz

You can find the seafood version of the dish, which is lighter and possibly has fewer calories, at certain restaurants.

Simply put, the meat is replaced with fish and shellfish!

Pastes

Pastes is a brioche with very small air pockets. It is a speciality of Léon (from Brest to Morlaix).

It comes in plain, raisin and prune versions. Enjoy it on its own or with butter (salted of course!).

You can find it in most bakeries on the Côte des Légendes, but if you want the real "pastes experience", head on over to the site at Meneham. The bread oven is put back to work when events are held there, and a retired baker makes pastechoù, to the delight of visitors eager to sample flavours of old.

Kig ha farz

Code name: KHF, pronounced "kee-ga-farz", is a restorative dish from northern Finistère (formerly Léon). Made with meat and vegetables, it is similar to a stew, but with a Breton touch. You see, KHF is accompanied by black or white farz (a sort of thick pancake cooked in broth) and a succulent butter sauce with shallots known as lipig.



Recipe for KHF

by Hervé Bécam of the restaurant La Butte in Plouider INGREDIENTS (SERVES 8-10 PEOPLE):

<u>Dumpling</u>: 1 kg buckwheat flour, 60 cl cream, 4 eggs, approx. 500 ml milk, 20 g salt. <u>Stew</u>: vegetables (1 cabbage, about 10 carrots, celery, rutabaga and onions), lightly salted pork (knuckle and lard), beef (tail and cheek).

DUMPLING PREPARATION:

Mix the buckwheat and eggs. Salt and gradually add enough milk to achieve fairly compact dough. Stir until even, then add cream and mix. The dough's consistency should be even and creamy, but not too thin. Put it in a linen sack that you previously soaked in water. Tie the sack shut with cooking twine (above the dumpling) and plunge it into boiling water with the pork knuckles. Boil for 3 hrs.

STEW PREPARATION:

Put the beef and vegetables (except the cabbage) in a pot. Cover them with water and salt with coarse salt (40 g). Bring to a boil and cook for 2 hrs. Add the cabbage and cook for another 45 min.

Arrange the meat and vegetables on a service dish. Remove the dumpling from the sack and crumble it little by little, then present in a shallow dish. Serve as is or accompanied by *lipig* (a sauce with a butter and shallot base).




